Trailing Snowberry

Symphoricarpos mollis



Trailing Snowberry is a deciduous native groundcover that grows low and up to 1m (3ft) in height. It forms a dense thicket that spreads by rhizomes throughout the landscape.

The small white to pinkish flowers bloom from May to August and is a rich source of nectar that hummingbirds and other pollinators love to feed on. It then forms white fruit berries that look like tiny snowballs in September and October and can sometimes persist throughout the winter. Wildlife may eat from the plant but berries are non edible for humans.

For winter color plant with red twig dogwood or Oregon Grape.

Sun/part shade, drought tolerant, works well as an understory plant and protected from direct sunlight during hot summer months. Once mature prune in early spring by removing the largest heaviest canes right to the ground.
